FROM PASTOR HANS

Dear Calvary Friends in Faith,

I almost lost my son at Fleet Farm.

Yup. Don't judge. I was looking for a new flannel shirt at Fleet Farm. My son, Lars (three years old at the time), was by my side. All of a sudden, he was gone. Of course, at first I thought he was hiding in the middle of the clothes racks like kids do. So, I used my cute Dad voice, "Lars, where are you? Come out, come out wherever you are!" No response. A bead of sweat rolls down my back and I started to think: I've lost a lot of things, but never a child. This is not going to go over well with my wife. I raised my voice, "Lars, come out...NOW!" Soon I'm frantically running from clothes rack to clothes rack, then through the isles, hollering, "LAAAARS!!!" After the longest three minutes of my life, I peered down an isle and there he was, standing with a friendly young couple. The lost was found.

Our year-long theme is "Church in the Wild." Together we're wondering: What does it mean to be people of faith out in the wild of daily life where we often feel lost? Parenting doesn't come with a manual. Kids get cut from teams and adults are let go from jobs. We know broken marriages, stressful finances, depression and the loss of loved ones. We know what it means to be lost.

During the weeks leading up to Easter we're going to explore Bible stories about people and things that were lost. And, as we do, we'll remember that when we are lost, there is one who knows where we are and is unafraid to walk with us in the wild. And, come Easter, we'll celebrate because we have a God with whom we are never lost!

Inside these pages you'll read about some of the ways God is using our church family to walk with those of us who feel lost now and then — from young families to elders, busy newlyweds to the aged who are unable to leave their homes. God is scooping up all of us who sometimes feel lost in the loving arms of this family of faith we call "Calvary."

Come, worship with your church family this Lent and Easter, and know you are always found!

WHAT DOES "CHURCH IN THE WILD" MEAN TO YOU?

As I think of our theme, Church in the Wild, I am reminded that Jesus' work wasn't done in nice and organized ways, but with people who didn't have everything perfect. My own faith practices happen during my messy day—in conversations with kids on our way to school, reading my devotional while drying my hair, meeting girlfriends for a Bible study over a

glass of wine, and sneaking in the back pew a minute before church starts. My husband and I often joke that this "wild" world is what we have, and we need to embrace the ways our faith can be part of it.

HOW DOES FAITH IMPACT YOUR LEADERSHIP OUT IN THE WILD, MONDAY-SATURDAY?

As an elementary principal, I work with over 500 students and families, and over 100 staff members, and it's amazing to see God at work every day. Earlier this fall, a community member proudly gave me a check from his church for whatever our kids needed. Last week we discovered a student who wasn't getting enough food at home, so we provided her with Backpack Attack food on weekends. I also see many adults providing love and structure for kids who don't ask for it in the best ways, and I see children being friends and forgiving others who don't fit in a pretty box. With this said, I'm reminded often how God gives me strength to lead in my career and to support my own family.

The Wilderness of Dementia

Like many families, the Dittberners have a tradition of celebrating Christmas together. And with 20 members of the family, they've opted to keep gift-giving simple: each person is assigned another family member's name and given a \$25 spending limit.





Emma Sieling is 3rd born among all of the Dittberner grandchildren, and this year she was matched up with her grandfather, Dave. She bought him the flannel shirt she knew he needed, but she wanted to do something more personal as well. Emma knew her grandfather struggled to keep his hands still as a result of his progressing Alzheimer's. "His hands are always moving—constantly folding napkins or tying things," said Carol, the matriarch of the family.

So Emma researched online and discovered something called a Fidget Quilt. She found old shirts and pants at thrift stores, using the buttons, zippers, and buckles to create panels on the front of the quilt, also printing family

photos on the fabric. Carol beams thinking about Emma's gift. "It was a great surprise to everyone—the highlight of our Christmas celebration!"

Carol admits there are challenges watching a spouse struggle with this terrible disease. She is grateful for all the help from her children and grandchildren, as well as the local support group she faithfully attends. "We have to talk about Alzheimer's," she says. "It's important for others to know they aren't alone." Always positive, Carol reflects, "Dave and I are so blessed to be together for all these years." This summer, the family will celebrate again as Emma becomes the first Dittberner grandchild to be married. In fact, it's no coincidence for this tightly-knit family that Emma will marry Colin Erickson the same week in June that Dave and Carol were married nearly 60 years ago.



Faith For Life Speaker: Brian McLaren

On April 5 at 6pm, Brian McLaren will wrap up this year's Faith for Life Speaker Series. He will help us think about what it means to love your neighbor, regardless of their race, creed or religion, in what he calls a more humble, inclusivist approach to live like Jesus. Brian is a popular conference speaker and a frequent guest lecturer for denominational and ecumenical leadership gatherings—across the US and Canada, Latin America, Europe, Africa, and Asia. His public speaking covers a broad range of topics including postmodern thought and culture, Biblical studies, evangelism, leadership, global mission, spiritual formation, worship, inter-religious dialogue, and social justice.



A frequent guest on television, radio, and news media programs, his work has also been covered in Time (where he was listed as one of American's 25 most influential evangelicals), Christianity Today, Christian Century, the Washington Post, Huffington Post, CNN.com, among others.

In "A New Kind of Christianity" (HarperOne, 2010), Brian articulated ten questions that are central to the emergence of a postmodern, postcolonial Christian faith. Brian's "Why Did Jesus, Moses, the Buddha, and Mohammed Cross the Road? (Christian Identity in a Multi-Faith World)" explores the intersection of religious identity, inter-religious hostility, and human solidarity.

His 2016 release, "The Great Spiritual Migration," has been hailed as his most important work to date. While with us, Brian will focus specifically on a conversation we started last year about interfaith dialog and commitment to loving our neighbor—especially those of a different faith.
